

THE MARYLAND WILDLIFE ADVISORY COMMISSION  
MINUTES – AUGUST 15, 2012

Chairman Jeffrey Plummer called the meeting to order at 9:25 a.m.

**Approval for the August 15, 2012 Meeting Agenda**

- The August 15, 2012 Wildlife Advisory Commission Meeting Agenda was presented to the Commission.
- Motion:
  1. Commissioner Gulbrandsen motioned to accept the August 15, 2012 Meeting Agenda as presented.
  2. Commissioner Boyles Griffin seconded.
  3. All in favor. Motion passed.

**Approval for Minutes from July 25, 2012 Meeting**

- The July 25<sup>th</sup> meeting minutes were distributed to the Commission prior to the meeting.
- Motion:
  1. Commissioner Gulbrandsen motioned to approve the July 25<sup>th</sup> meeting minutes as presented.
  2. Commissioner Boyles Griffin seconded.
  3. All in favor. Motion passed.

**The Finalized Selections of 2012-2013 Waterfowl Seasons** – Presentation given by Larry Hindman, Waterfowl Project Leader

- Mr. Hindman summarized the public comments on the proposed 2012-2013 waterfowl seasons. [ATTACHMENT A] The public comments were general supportive of the waterfowl season proposals with a few exceptions.
- Youth Waterfowl Hunting days are November 3<sup>rd</sup> and February 9<sup>th</sup> that included an extra youth waterfowl day. The Light Goose Conservation Order Season will be closed on February 9<sup>th</sup>.
- The only change to the duck hunting season is that hunters may take four scaup.
- Five additional days have been added to the AP Canada Goose Hunting Season. Two of the additional days were added in December and the remaining three days were added to the January days.
- Questions and Answers Section:
  1. Commissioner Boyles Griffin wanted to confirm that the USFWS established the Light Goose Conservation Order Season.
    - a. Yes, the USFWS started the Light Goose Conservation Order Season (LGCOS). An Environmental Assessment was completed.
    - b. Light geese are considered overabundant. The spring count for greater snow geese was over 1,000,000 birds. The population objective is around 500,000 to 750,000 birds.
    - c. The Conservation Order is in place to increase the harvest of these birds.
  2. Commissioner Boyles Griffin asked about the tools available during the LGCOS.
    - a. During the LGCOS hunters may use unplugged shotguns that can hold more than three shells, electronic calls may be used and shooting hours are extended to half-hour after sunset.
  3. Commissioner Boyles Griffin asked how many Light Geese are harvested during the half-hour after sunset window.
    - a. Mr. Hindman will get that information to the Commission. However, it is available online. WHS does not have that data from the other states.
    - b. The survey that was sent out to hunters requested information about how many geese were harvested with these extra tools. In the majority of the cases, the electronic call was most effective.

4. The Eastern Mallard breeding population (BPOP) index is used to set the Atlantic Flyway (AF) duck hunting regulations. Duck Season will include a liberal regulation option with a 60-day season and 6-duck bag limit for the AF states. There are no changes to the Black Duck hunting regulations.
  5. Commissioner Gulbrandsen asked how the February 9<sup>th</sup> Youth Waterfowl Day interacts with adults carrying firearms restrictions.
    - a. The adult who is taking a youth hunter is not permitted to carry a weapon on any Youth Waterfowl Day. This allows the focus to be on the youth hunter.
- Motion:
    1. Chairman Plummer reminded the Commission that there are basically three changes to the 2012-2013 Late Waterfowl Hunting Seasons and Bag Limits. Commissioner Boyles Griffin mentioned that she will have to oppose the Light Goose Conservation Order Season with hunting hours ending one half-hour after sunset. Chairman Plummer suggested that the Commission take a vote on the three changes - the additional Youth Waterfowl Day on February 9<sup>th</sup>, four scaup and the 50-day AP Canada Goose Season.
    2. Commissioner Gregor motioned to accept the three changes to the 2012-2013 Late Waterfowl Hunting Seasons and Bag Limits.
      - a. Commissioner Gulbrandsen seconded.
      - b. Motion passed.

**Break 10:05 am to 10:10 am**

**Announcements:**

- Chairman Plummer thanked Commissioner Gregor for attending the 2012-2013 Late Waterfowl Hunting Seasons and Bag Limits public meeting. Commissioner Gregor mentioned that the public meeting was very informative.
- Chairman Plummer also recognized Bill Harvey, Game Bird Project Leader and Hutch Walbridge, Game Bird Biologist for their restoration work on Deal Island Impoundment.

**WHS Information and Education Program** – Presentation given by Patricia Handy, Information and Education Program Manager

- Karina Stonesifer is the Associate Director of Regional Operations Program that includes the Information and Education Program. Ms. Stonesifer will be presenting an update on the Regional Operations Program in October.
- Ms. Patricia Handy provided an overview of the Information and Education Program in a Power Point Presentation to the Commission. **[ATTACHMENT B]**
- America's relationship to land and wildlife are undeniable part of our natural heritage. Wildlife's conservation and preservation of the habitat is one of the biggest challenges that we face today. There are several education programs that are sponsored or supported by the Wildlife and Heritage Service. These programs help improve our knowledge and understanding of wildlife and nature.
  1. Becoming an Outdoors-Woman (BOW)
  2. Project Wild
  3. Junior Hunter Field Days
  4. Mentored Youth Hunts
  5. National Hunting and Fishing Day
  6. Environthon
  7. Education Trucks

- Questions and Answers:
  1. Chairman Plummer asked are the mentored youth matched up with commercial operations.
    - a. Yes, the mentored youths that attended the Mentored Youth hunts were matched up with commercial operations along with their parent/guardian. There is a bidding process for each region. Staff asked Regulated Shooting Areas to participate in this bidding process to determine where the Mentored Youth hunts will be held.
- Chairman Plummer applauded Ms. Handy for all the work that this group does.
- Ms. Stonesifer mentioned that WHS Information and Education Program staff members are Ms. Handy and Ms. Kerry Wixted. These are two full-time people who are dedicated to everything that was outlined. They do a lot of work with volunteers and WHS staff to get some of these programs done.
- Chairman Plummer asked what some of the budget cuts that Information and Education Program had to endure during the economic downturn.
  1. The Information and Education Program had to get creative to ensure these programs continue.
  2. As a unit, staff members have stood by the Information and Education Program and the importance of it. A lot of people would look at the Information and Education Program as an easy target for budget cuts because it is difficult to see tangible results.
  3. Staff members do tremendous amount of fund raising for some of these programs. There are friends of BOW that provide assistance along with an advisory board that helps with the fundraising.
  4. In the end, however, a full time position was eliminated that supported National Archery in the Schools and other programs.

**Maryland Farm Bureau Update** – no report.

**Natural Resources Police (NRP) Update** – Presentation given by Captain Lloyd Ingerson.

- Captain Ingerson handed out the Maryland Natural Resources Police List of Violation Types [ATTACHMENT C]. Commissioner Compton requested this information a couple months ago.
- The hunting statistic is pretty much accurate. For fishing and boating, data may not be completely accurate because data is still being entered.
- There are still 17 candidates in the NRP Academy Class. These candidates are due for field training sometime in October or November. This field training will last through the winter months and then the cadets will return to the classroom training. Graduation will probably be held in February or March.
- NRP is recruiting for the next class which will start in April of 2013. The application process is available online.
- The Cadet Program has been reintroduced. The Cadet Program will focus on individuals between the ages of 18 to 20, who are not old enough to be officers yet. There was a supplemental budget approval of around \$1.3 million dollars to reinstate the Cadet Program. NRP is looking to bring on thirteen to fifteen new cadets for this program.
  1. Chairman Plummer requested that Commissioner Compton receive an electronic copy of the Maryland Natural Resources Police List of Violation Types.
  2. Captain Ingerson agreed to send Ms. Spencer an electronic copy of the Maryland Natural Resources Police List of Violation Types.
- Questions and Answers Section
  1. Chairman Plummer asked if the \$1.3 million dollars allocation was just for the NRP Cadet

Program.

- a. With the hiring process along with polygraphs and other items such as uniforms and equipment, salaries, and benefits, it adds up over a period of time. There may be some other items but the majority of this funding is for the NRP Cadet Program.
2. Chairman Plummer mentioned there has been some misunderstanding on deer tagging.
- Chairman Plummer recommended that NRP take their top five violations and add them to the hunting guide to make hunters aware of these items. In doing so, this may reduce the violations because most of these are probably that hunters do not know.
  1. Mr. Pete Jayne indicated that staff could add a section for that.
  2. Captain Ingerson agreed that NRP could provide this information for that section of the guide.

### **Old Business**

- Commissioner Rodney asked if Chairman Plummer received responses from Governor O'Malley and Secretary Griffin on the letters that the Commission sent them.
  1. Chairman Plummer indicated that he has not received response letters from Governor O'Malley and Secretary Griffin.
- Chairman Plummer outlined importance of visiting the hunting forums and attending the meetings such as the Waterfowl Seasons and Bag Limits Meeting. Chairman Plummer mentioned that he thinks a lot of people do not realize that this Commission exists or the mission of the Commission. Chairman Plummer tried to make it public at the Waterfowl Seasons and Bag Limits Meeting the letters that the Commission wrote to Governor O'Malley and Secretary Griffin. Chairman Plummer encouraged the members of the Commission to promote the Commission's message.
- Commissioner Boyles Griffin mentioned that maybe the Commission could have a press release for the meetings.
  1. The Commission meeting agendas along with the meeting minutes and attachments are posted on the DNR's website.
  2. Chairman Plummer mentioned a lot of this information was made available by Candy Thomson, writer for the Baltimore Sun.
  3. Commissioner Boyles Griffin recalled someone mentioning having one of the WAC meetings somewhere else and doing something other than having a meeting.
- Chairman Plummer requested that Ms. Spencer send the WAC link to the Commission for members to disseminate to the public.
- Mr. Jayne added that WHS could add the WAC link to the hunting guide. Currently, WAC's email address is listed in the guide but not the link to the webpage.

### **New Business**

- Chairman Plummer pointed out that Mr. Kurt Fuchs sent him an email about Mr. Fuchs taking a new position at Mid-Atlantic Farm Credit as their liaison. As of August, Mr. Fuchs was still at the MFB but Mr. Fuchs could not make it to the August WAC meeting. The Commission will miss Mr. Fuchs. Hopefully, there will be a replacement appointed but Chairman Plummer does not know when.

# DNR Priorities Considered when Formulating Hunting Season Proposals

- Must meet the biological requirements of the waterfowl resource to sustain populations
- Hunting regulations are also used to reduce overabundant populations.
- Maximize opportunity for all hunters, particularly youth by opening seasons on Saturdays and maximizing the frequency of Saturdays and holidays within the seasons.
- Overlap of duck and goose seasons to the extent possible.
- Keep hunting regulations simple and easy to understand.



# Youth Waterfowl Hunting Days

## Proposed Days

Nov. 3 and Feb. 9

## Proposed Bag Limit

6 ducks (certain species restrictions), 15 coots, 2 Canada geese (AP area) or 5 geese (AFRP area), 2 brant, and 25 light geese.

## Requirements

Youth hunter(s) must be accompanied by an adult at least 21 years old. The parent or mentor must possess a hunting license or be exempt from the hunting license requirement.

Adult may assist in calling, setting decoys, retrieving downed birds, but may not possess a hunting weapon.



# Summary of Public Comment Youth Waterfowl Hunting Days

- Strong support for the proposed Youth Waterfowl Hunting Days and especially scheduling the second day in February.
- Proposed youth waterfowl dates supported by DNR Migratory Game Bird Advisory Committee (MGBAC).
- Would like the federal and State youth age requirement be the same.

6 per day (including mergansers) but no more than 5 long-tailed ducks, 4 scoters, 4 mallards (2 hens), 4 scaup, 3 wood ducks, 2 hooded mergansers, 1 canvasback, 1 black duck (during black duck season), 1 mottled duck, and 1 fulvous tree duck.

# Summary of Public Comment

## Regular Duck Season

- Strong support for the proposed season dates and bag limits.
- Supported by the MGBAC.
- A few would like to see the October season to start one week earlier to coincide with wood duck abundance in their area.
- Concern about the scaup bag limit of 4 per day and the wood duck bag limit of 3 per day.
- A few want the season to run to January 30 and end the same day as AP geese (more liberal than the federal framework).
- A few want a special wood duck season in September (more liberal than the federal framework).

# Summary of Public Comment

## AP Canada Goose Season

- Strong support for the proposed AP goose season length (50 days), season dates, and bag limit.
- Strong support for the proposal for placing 2 additional days in December to start AP goose season and ducks on same day.
- Proposed season length, season dates, and bag limit supported by MGBAC.
- A few wanted days taken from earlier in the season and added late so the AP goose season would end on Saturday February 2.
- Always a few comments to consider opening season to coincide with the Easton Waterfowl Festival Nov. 9-11 (more liberal than the federal framework).

# Summary of Public Comment

## AFRP Canada Goose Season

- Most hunters preferred the proposed AFRP goose season dates and bag limits.
- Proposed season length, season dates, and bag limit supported by MGBAC.
- Always a few hunters who want the boundary separating the AP and AFRP harvest areas modified to allow for greater AFRP goose harvest opportunity (Prince Georges, Howard, Carroll, Baltimore counties) (more liberal than the federal framework).


# AFRP Regular Season Zone Evaluation Criteria

## 2008-2010 seasons


- All areas holding an AFRP regular season must collectively account for **no more than a 1% adult direct recovery rate for any migrant goose population (AP, SJB, NAP)** in the flyway with an open regular AFRP season.
- AFRP areas must account for **no more than 10% of all AP recoveries in any state** during the next 3-year period (2008-2010).
